Defining your Themes

- Keep them dynamic
 - The best themes are dynamic and allow for a wide range of characters to evolve around them
- You can have multiple themes in a story
 - You can have a main theme and then spin-off themes that still relate to the central one
 - Need to make sure that the different themes and characters tie in at the end
- Different devices can be used to illustrate the theme(s) of a story
 - Plot
 - Symbols
 - Setting (beautiful good world vs ugly bad world)
 - Characters

Defining your Themes

- · How do the characters illustrate a theme?
 - Characters can set a theme by learning it for themselves: growth, some sort of lesson, these are themes perfectly suited to be demonstrated by the character's journey
- Themes are not as scary as they look
 - Tend to come to us after the story has already been written
